They were a mix of medically retired and active duty representing different branches of the service.

Most arrived on Thursday so they would be fresh and rested for the tournament. They were treated to dinner at Hondo's on Main and dessert at Clear River Ice Cream, Bakery & Deli who donated tickets for free ice cream.

Friday morning was clear and sunny at Boot Ranch. However it was over cast at Lady Bird Johnson airport so take off was delayed until the ceiling met FAA requirements. WWII airplanes flew over Boot Ranch 'strafing' the area where golfers were gathered waiting for the games to begin.

Their acrobatics were curtailed somewhat as low hanging clouds had moved in. One of the planes carried a former Ranger now living in San Antonio after being medically retired.



In addition to playing golf there was an area to stop and shoot clay pigeons and another for shooting a crossbow. And lest anyone get hungry or thirsty, food & beverage stations were scattered throughout the golf course and beverage carts cruised the course.

Each of our golfers was placed with a foursome that welcomed them like old friends even providing a pointer or two along the way.





Nine years ago when this ministry first started, Sharon and Wayne Massey donated use of the first guest house we used to bring wounded warriors and families out for a weekend. Being a Marine veteran of three (3) wars, Wayne understood the importance of reintegration with family and society. All he asked was that we include Marines in our events. As you can see in his obituary following, he truly was a Marine with a generous heart.

William Wayne Massey Nov. 19, 1924 – Sept. 14, 2020

William Wayne Massey, 95, passed away peacefully at home surrounded by family on Monday, Sept. 14, 2020, in Fredericksburg, Texas.

A family graveside service will be held Friday, Sept. 25, 2020, at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery in San Antonio. Pastor George Lumpkin of Fredericksburg United Methodist Church will officiate. A retired Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps, Wayne will be buried with military honors. Arrangements are by Fredericksburg Funeral Home and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. A memorial service will be held at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 26, 2020, at McCurdy Creek Ranch in Fredericksburg.

Wayne was born Nov. 19, 1924, to Zela Catherine (Hollis) and Jess Robert Massey in Mills County, Texas. He went to school in Goldthwaite, Texas, then joined the Marine Corps immediately afterward to fight in World War II. He served our country as a veteran of three wars – World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

He was awarded the Bronze Star and received the Legion of Merit from President Lyndon Baines Johnson in 1972 for his outstanding service as Commanding Officer of the Marine Barracks, U.S. Naval Station, Sangley Point, in the Philippines from 1969 to 1971. As a result of his work improving relations between Cavite City and the naval station, Wayne was officially adopted as a "Son of Cavite" in 1971, an honor never before accorded to a Marine officer. He retired from the Marines after 28 years of service.

After his military service, Wayne was hired by William Wrigley as the CEO of the Catalina Island Corporation in California. He then became a real estate agent and developer and returned to Texas. He helped many folks design and build their dream homes in Fredericksburg, as owner of Massey Construction.

Wayne was married to Bobbie Louise Obenhaus, and they welcomed their daughter, Catherine Ann Massey, in 1958. Wayne married Sharon Beth McKenzie on March 20, 1982, adding her children, Peter and Emily McKenzie, to his family.

Wayne was active in the Rotary Club for many years, ultimately serving as President of the Fredericksburg Rotary Club and Governor of Rotary District 5840 from 1994 to 1995. He helped found the Fredericksburg High School Interact Club and the Fredericksburg Morning Club, as well as the District 5840 Hunger Plus Program. Wayne served as the District 5840 delegate to a Rotary Council of Legislation in India and was honored multiple times as a Paul Harris Fellow for his contributions to The Rotary Foundation. He and Sharon also hosted 10 international high school students over the years through Rotary Youth Exchange.

Wayne was preceded in death by his parents, former wife, and six siblings: brothers, Dale, Rob and Ralph Massey; and sisters, Fay Kight, Freda Caulder and Floy Rowlett.

He is survived by his wife, Sharon Beth, and his children and their spouses: Catherine and Thain Cashmore, Peter and Sophia McKenzie, Emily and Chris White, and honorary daughter Teresa Jenschke; his sister, Floree Shannon; eight grandchildren and two greatgranddaughters.
